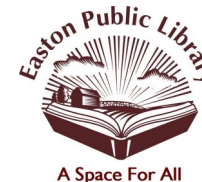

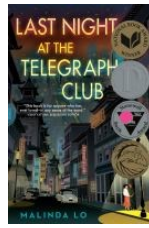

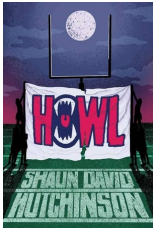
**Last Night at the Telegraph Club**

A gripping, dynamic portrayal of the oftentimes traumatic experience of growing up...with a twist.



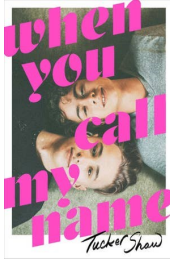
**Squad** by Maggie Tokuda-Hall & Lisa Sterle

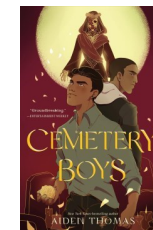
**Blackwater** by Jeannette Arroyo & Rem Graham

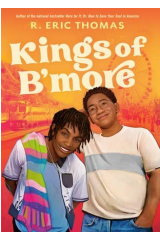
**Burn Down, Rise Up** by Vincent Tirado
