Kirkus Reviews describes the novel as "a coming-of-age story that beautifully combines tradition and technology for modern audiences." I can remember the time and place when I began a lifelong love affair with libraries. I grew up on Long Island, in a town blessed with two public libraries and a traveling bookmobile. While the libraries offered a wonderful selection of books and cultured events, including intimate performances from members of the New York Philharmonic Orchestra and NYC Ballet, who lived in our town, I loved the bookmobile that pulled up to our town green in all types of weather. Located near our home, I would go with my mother in rain or snow, with my rain boots, book bag, and umbrella or snowsuit, anticipating what new Laura Ingalls Wilder books I would find on the narrow shelves.



Fast forward to high school and college, and I found myself biking to work in the local library. My first job was working the front desk, meeting wonderful patrons and checking out their books and records, and when the evenings were quiet, I shelved returned books, studying the Dewey Decimal System. In the process, I discovered Thornton Wilder and Greek mythology. I had the opportunity to manage the Children's Room on the weekends, reading *The Very Hungry Caterpillar* and *Lyle, Lyle Crocodile* to a rapt audience.

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




comforting, especially in these times, to see familiar faces, like Bob, Larry, Ryan, and Penelope, who are helpful and kind.




Community Partner Spotlight: Easton Park & Recreation



Friends of the Easton Public Library




The Friends of the Easton Public Library is a 501(c)(3) organization made up of local volunteers and members who raise money to help support the library.

Past fundraisers have included participating in the nationwide Library Giving Day in early April; hosting a wine and cheese gathering to kick off the summer with Eastonites old and new; running a fabulous used book sale; and hosting a holiday craft fair and tree lighting in early December. More events are in the works!

Recent events have already raised \$12,500 to support the library for 2022: in April we raised nearly \$4,500 as part of the National Library Giving Day campaign, and in June we raised \$2,000 more, as part of our Wine Tasting fundraiser. Our book sale garnered \$6,000. Thank you to the generosity of our wonderful library lovers from all across the town. We are grateful. All these provide financial support to the library beyond what is in its annual budget. In the past year the Friends have given money to support the refurbishment of the patio at the library for gatherings and fun activities for library patrons and their friends; the Summer Reading Program for adults and children alike; the One Book/One Town initiative, and the purchase of museum passes for everyone in town to use.

Collection Spotlight: Historical Collection

Did you know that the Easton Public Library has a collection dedicated to the town's history? Primarily located inside the Conference Room, the Historical Collection features many items that historians or genealogists might find useful. Physical copies of the Annual Town Report, dating back to 1932, and older versions of the Easton Directory make up a large part of the collection, but there are numerous other



resources too, including digital copies of the print version of The Easton Courier, from 2009-2017, information on area cemeteries, the Aspetuck Land Trust, the town's archaeological survey, a



binder with information about the historic homes in Easton, and items related to Easton schools. There is also a section with the works of local authors, including Ed and Lorraine Warren, Elizabeth George Speare, Edna Ferber, and Patricia Hubbell, as well as several copies of *Easton* — *Its History*. In addition to books and other print media, there is also original music by resident Jim Freund.

We couldn't talk about the

Historical Collection without mentioning the Dolly Curtis Collection. Dolly made a name for herself with her radio show where she interviewed hundreds of people doing what they do best. These DVDs can be found in the DVD section in the front of the Library. Staff members are always willing to help patrons with their research about the town's history, so stop in and browse the collection yourself. You may find out something you never knew before.
